MINUTES

February 14, 2022

The Advisory Fire Commission met at a regular meeting on Monday, February 14, 2022. Chair Guichard called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Jonee Grassi, who lives in Richmond in a high fire severity zone, is concerned about evacuation routes and wildfire prevention. She asked when that area will be addressed with something like the shaded fuel break CCCFPD is working on.

Fire Chief Broschard responded that although Measure X funds will not be available until spring and there is no guarantee that the District will be awarded funds, the District has been working with the Wildcat Canyon Forum, East Bay Parks, and various subject matter experts and is in the process of assessing where Measure X funds could best be leveraged in the county.

Chief Bachman, Fire Marshal, suggested Ms. Grassi check with the City of Richmond as they also applied for the same grant seeking funds for mitigation work in Richmond.

Commissioner Fields requested that Items B.1., B.3. and B.5. be moved to Discussion.

Commissioner Nakano made a motion to accept and file Items A., B.2., and B.4. Motion seconded by Commissioner Chapman. Motion passed (AYES: Betser, Chapman, Daugelli, Egan, Galey, Guichard; Nakano; ABSTAIN: Betser and Galey for Item A. only).

DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Personnel Report

Commissioner Fields asked about the vacancy left by the Mechanic who separated from the District. Chief Broschard noted that the District is in the process of onboarding a new Mechanic. He also noted that we are losing qualified mechanics to others companies that pay higher salaries. Because our salaries are lower, it is very difficult to recruit for this position.

B. Fire Prevention Report

Commissioner Fields asked about conviction rates on the arson arrests. Chief Bachman, Fire Marshal, shared that more than half of the arrests were for exterior fires, but he was not aware of the conviction rate.

C. Suppression Leave Summary

Commissioner Fields asked about high mandatory overtime numbers in January. Chief Broschard noted that we currently have just under ten percent of suppression staff out on workers' compensation, and other districts are experiencing similar staffing issues. We are looking forward to the graduating academies to provide some relief.

Commissioner Daugelli made a motion to accept and file Items B.1., B.3., and B.5. Motion seconded by Commissioner Egan. Motion passed (AYES: Betser, Chapman, Daugelli, Egan, Galey, Guichard; Nakano; ABSTAIN: None).

D. Declaration of Surplus Equipment – Report of January 18, 2022

Commissioner Egan made a motion to approve the surplus of equipment listed on the declaration report of January 18, 2022. Motion seconded by Commissioner

Chapman. Motion passed (AYES: Betser, Chapman, Daugelli, Egan, Galey, Guichard; Nakano; ABSTAIN: None).

E. Discuss Commission Roles and Bylaws

Chair Guichard opened the discussion by sharing that he did some research and found that the Commission's standing committees are holdovers from long ago when the Fire District was in need of that type of involvement from the Commission. In recent years, the only committee that has seen activity has been the Bylaws Committee. The most recent revision to the Bylaws concerned changing Alternate commissioners to At-Large Alternate commissioners.

Chair Guichard also noted that Supervisor Andersen likes that the Commissioners are out in the community to pick up on matters of concern that can be shared at Commission meetings and/or with the Board of Supervisors.

Commissioner Nakano expressed that there should be definition and clarity for what committees are responsible for and should be reporting out at meetings. Without functionality and purpose, there is no point of having committees.

Chief Broschard, adding to Chair Guichard's comments, noted the Commission resembled more of a governing body when it was formed long ago. His concern now would be creating functions that do not serve the District's current needs.

Commissioner Galey noted that none of these committees have been active during the numerous years she has served on the Commission and she does not think they are needed.

Chair Guichard suggested that each Commissioner reach out to their respective supervisor to get a better sense of their expectations and the discussion can be continued to the next meeting.

Commissioner Egan posed the question of whether or not the Commission is needed at all anymore. People ask him when Station 4 will reopen and not about much else.

At Chair Guichard's request, Jill Ray, Field Representative for Supervisor Candace Andersen, shared that other advisory bodies generally use their subcommittees to do deeper dives on topics of interest.

Chair Guichard suggested that this matter be discussed further at the next meeting.

Jill Ray kindly offered to help Latonia Ellingberg, recording secretary and staff to the Commission, gather information on the history of the Commission.

ZONEHAVEN PRESENTATION

Deputy Chief McAlister presented a PowerPoint presentation on the Zonehaven project.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Reviewed/discussed the February 14, 2022 Fire Chief's report.

Commissioner Egan asked if the Station 4 reopening is still planned for July. Chief Broschard confirmed that it is, depending on how many graduates come out of the next two academies and barring any other staffing issues.

COMMISSIONERS' COMMENTS / ITEMS FOR FUTURE AGENDAS

Commissioner Guichard would like an update on the Morgan Territory Community Association and continuation of the Bylaws discussion.

Commissioner Bana would like an update on when the sign(s) will be placed in her area. Chief Bachman will follow up.

Commissioner Bana also asked if the Fire District can reach out to the Board of Supervisors about including an information sheet about Zonehaven in the envelopes when tax bills are sent out; the notice would also advise residents to register for CWS.

NOTES

1. The suppression staffing report reflects full staffing with 29 fire companies and three Shift Training Captains. In July 2019, a fourth firefighter was added to Trucks 6, 83, and 84. In March 2020, a fourth firefighter was added to Trucks 1 and 14 and Engine 10. The positions are partially funded by the SAFER grant awards. In September 2019, three (3) Fire Captain-Paramedics were added for the Helicopter Emergency Medical Services Program at Buchanan Airport. In July 2021, three (3) Fire Captain positions were added to staff Truck 70.
2. Negative numbers represent a surplus over minimum staffing. Incumbents will fill vacancies created by retirements.
3. Current Firefighter surpluses also include staffing for ECCFPD Fire Station 55 (effective June 2022) and Fire Station 4 in Walnut Creek (effective July 2022).

RE: Fire Chief's Report

- Annexation Update. The annexation process continues with the Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCo) decision-making process, which included the body's vote at its February 9 meeting to expand the Con Fire sphere of influence to include the current East Contra Costa Fire areas of responsibility. The LAFCo public hearing on the boundary reorganization was held on March 9.
- Pinole Fire Contract for Service Initiative. We continue to work with the City of Pinole Fire Chief and City Manager and are researching the necessary components and process steps to develop a contract for service.
- Operations Update. In February, three honor guard members traveled to Baltimore to honor the three firefighters killed in the line of duty battling a row house fire there.



We also sent one engine company, one truck company, and two chief officers to cover Fire Station 4 in the city of Stockton so their crews could honor Captain Max Fortuna who was shot and killed while working at a fire in Stockton.



Off duty members also participated as members of the color guard and attendants for the folded flag presentation during the ceremony.



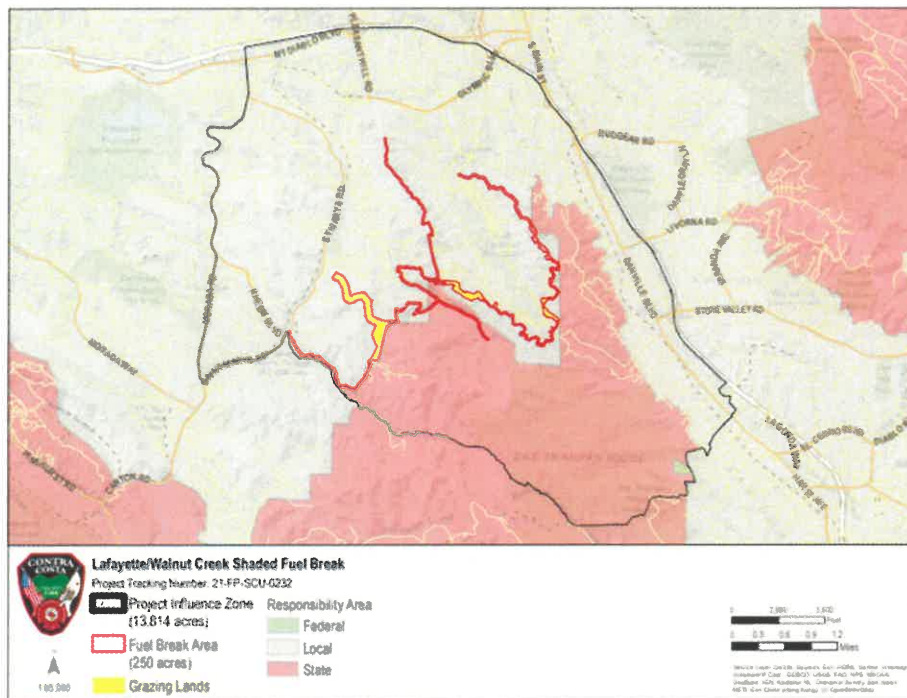
One member of our critical incident stress management (CISM) team provided assistance and support to Stockton's firefighters.

City of Stockton's firefighters supported Con Fire in our time of need when our line of duty deaths occurred in 2007. It was satisfying to stand with them when they needed our support. Events like these are vivid reminders of the dangers our own firefighters face on a daily basis.

- **Communications Update.** Multiple staffing initiatives are currently underway, including interviews for the Fire Communications Manager and Fire Dispatcher positions. A new permanent Information Systems Tech II started work last month; and we also on-boarded one new Fire Dispatcher.

Other Communications Division highlights include continued refinement of the design for our soon to be remodeled Fire Communications Center and continued work on IT support of the pending annexation initiative.

- **Fire Prevention Update.** We submitted our application to the Cal Fire California Climate Investments Fire Prevention Grant program for a proposed Lafayette/Walnut Creek Shaded Fuel Break on February 9. The project, if funded, would result in a 14-mile long shaded fuel break to supplement the North Orinda Shaded Fuel Break (in place to the north since late 2019) and the Tunnel East Bay Hills Break (currently under development by the Moraga-Orinda Fire District).



Related vegetation mitigation work would cover some 250 acres in Lafayette, Moraga, and Walnut Creek, as well as parts of the East Bay Regional Parks District. The entire shaded fuel break is in a High Fire Hazard Severity Zone with one section buffering a Very High Hazard Severity Zone of State Responsibility Area (SRA) near Los Trompas. The finalized cost submitted for the proposed project was just under the \$5 million resolution approved last month.

FPB made an update presentation to the Golden Rain Foundation Board at a recent meeting to gain their support for future ongoing fuel break maintenance costs around Rossmoor in addition to what Crew 12 will be able to provide.

The County Fire Marshals have begun meeting regularly to discuss the new fire code updates to be released by the state this summer for adoption by January 1, 2023. This coordinated effort will evaluate the local ordinances adopted by each fire jurisdiction to improve countywide consistency. The County ordinance is expected to be drafted by September for submission to the Board of Supervisors in October.

- EMS Update. All temporary system modifications approved by the County EMS Agency (CCCEMSA) were rescinded effective February 28 as operations and systems demand have normalized from the historic high 911 call volume attributable to the recent Omicron surge. These include changes that were implemented with CCCEMSA approval, including the use of non-system BLS ambulances, the pending of certain non-emergency calls during times when ambulance availability is low, and a change to the treat-and-refer policy in the field to reduce non-acute transports.

Meetings are being coordinated for local hospital, fire, and EMS leadership to discuss solutions for the increase in wait times for ambulances to offload patients at local emergency departments. Although this is a statewide problem, we are hopeful to be able to find solutions that will improve the situation within our county, decrease wait times for our ambulances to transfer patients, and improve system performance and reliability as a result.
